Well, I thought, Guess we might as well shut the doors right now. No point in going on.

Turns out the new church is a smart phone app! This way young people and others can experience God and the Bible, blogs, sermons and songs on their favorite device. They could be at Starbucks and have a little quiet time together.

It all sounded good, but I felt like there was something missing. I enjoy listening to religious podcasts and reading religious blogs and taking part in religious conversations on Facebook groups. They are all enriching and convenient, but I never think of them as church or as a replacement for church because church is people. More and more, I trust Jesus' promise that where two or three are gathered in his name, THERE is where he is actually going to be.

On Saturday I got a call from the hospital chaplain saying someone was dying in the emergency room and could I come and pray. There's no app for that.

The other week I got an email requesting a baptism for a baby born with birth defects who might not live long. There's no app for that.

Sunday morning a hungry person stopped by to ask for some food and I could give him a bag of goodies from our food pantry. There's no app for that.

Today I went to the funeral home to comfort a grieving widow and prepare a meaningful funeral service for her husband. There's no app for that.

This week our confirmation students will dedicate a tree they bought and planted in our green space in memory of one of their classmates who died. There is no app for that.

For decades now people have been predicting that the church is nothing but a dying institution, but I know that even though the church has its faults and needs to change and adapt, it is still the very Body of Christ on this earth. In my times of greatest need and my greatest joy, I need the people of God, my brothers and sisters in Christ. Technology can connect us in new and wonderful ways, but at the end of the day nothing can replace the communion of saints.

There's no app for that.

So we're not dead yet!

What makes caregiving Christian?

Many people take on a caregiving role at some time in their lives. Some of these caregivers are professionals who are paid for the care they provide. Many more caregivers are family members who care for a loved one who can no longer function independently because of disability, illness, or age. So what makes the care given by a Stephen Minister different from the caregiving provided by others?

The Stephen Minister (or other Christian caregiver) provides care because he or she recognizes what God has done for him/her and wants to follow the example of servanthood set by Jesus. This is stated so clearly in 1 John 4:19. *"We love because He first loved us."* Perhaps you have even sung about this great gift at Bible camp, *"The Lord of love has come to me. I want to pass it on."*

Like many other caregivers, Christian caregivers provide care to family members, but they may define *family+* differently. The Christian caregiver recognizes that the care receiver, whoever he or she is, is also a child of God. That makes the care receiver *family+* even when there are no relationship ties by blood, adoption, or marriage.

Most importantly, the Christian caregiver recognizes that his/her role is to provide accepting and non-judgmental care, but accepts that only God can provide a cure. The Christian caregiver is confident that God is working in the life of the care receiver and will accomplish His purpose in His own time.

If you could benefit from Christian care now, talk to one of the pastors, to a Stephen Leader (Karen Botine, Margaret Fiechter), or fill out the green Confidential Care Request card in the pew rack and drop it in the Confidential Care box at the Welcome desk in the lobby. If you know someone who would benefit from a Stephen Minister's care, please encourage that person to request a Stephen Minister, or make a referral (with the person's permission, of course).

Where Do I Start?

Perhaps you are well aware that you haven't made the necessary plans for what will happen to your family, your assets, or anything else you are responsible for (or want to support) when you are not here to make the decisions. The task of putting all this in place may be overwhelming. Perhaps you don't even know where to start.

If this describes you at all, plan to attend a legacy-planning workshop between worship services on Sunday, May 7, to help you begin thinking about the starting point for your planning. Faith Simonieg, Assistant to the WND Bishop for Stewardship and Generosity will provide guidance on where and how to begin your plan. You will also be able to schedule a follow-up conference with Faith to take the next step in your planning and to prepare for discussion with your own legal and/or financial advisors.

Perhaps you have already made plans for your legacy. How long ago was this done? Do your plans accurately reflect your current circumstances or priorities? Attending this workshop may be an opportunity to do a review of what you have in place and to identify any needed changes.
