HOLY GROUND

In April I had the privilege of visiting Israel, the Holy Land. I have actually been trying for a few years to go there and had even bought plane tickets twice before, but events forced me to cancel both trips. So, even though a late snow storm delayed this trip by a day, I finally made it.

I went with mixed expectations. On the one hand, this is the one spot on earth where Jesus actually walked. I know many people who have been profoundly moved by their experiences in the Holy Land. But then there are people who have been a bit disappointed because many of the "actual" sites where Jesus supposedly was are mere speculation at best. While I was there I felt both emotions. Some places – such as the Sea of Galilee- were beautiful and, even though I didn't know the exact spot where Jesus had been, I did know that I was sailing on the same lake that he had. That was a meaningful moment. But then, I discovered in Jerusalem that there are *two places* (!) claiming that they are where Jesus was crucified and buried. Does it really matter if either (or neither) place was historically accurate? Not really, but it got me thinking about where I really expected to find a significant connection to Jesus. I came to realize that there were many places in my life that were truly holy ground for me and they were not in Israel.

When I think of the places where I have most profoundly encountered Jesus, I think of my home church downtown Minneapolis, where I was baptized, received my first communion, and confirmed my faith. I think of Luther Theological Seminary in St. Paul, where my faith was challenged and grew and where I met colleagues in ministry who have supported me to this day. I think of the nature preserve in northern Minnesota where I went through the Men's Rites of Passage and was given a glimpse of the true vastness of the God we worship. I also think of Trinity Lutheran, where I have the privilege of walking with people through some of the most profound times in their lives – birth, marriage, sickness, joy, death. At Trinity I see faith being lived out in the lives of so many loving, faithful people.

Although I am deeply grateful for getting to visit the Holy Land, I realized that I certainly didn't need to go there to be on holy ground. How could it be otherwise? Jesus himself promised, "I am with you always, even to the ends of the earth."

Where is holy ground for you? It could be much closer than you think.

One thing too many...

"It's no big deal." Perhaps you've said this about some issue that has popped up in your life. This may be true, but if you are dealing with many small issues at one time, you may feel like you've been buried under a mountain of problems — each of which demands to be first on your "to-do" list.

Perhaps you are thankful that you are not experiencing the major life challenges that others are dealing with. If you are feeling overwhelmed by a multitude of "small" problems, however, you may still find the support of a Stephen Minister valuable, even for a short period of time. Talking with a Stephen Minister may help you get a new view of your collection of "little" problems and perhaps prioritize them so you can begin to take action. As you share what's going on in your life, you may also discover that some of the items on your list are things that are beyond your control to change. By discussing these with your Stephen Minister, you may be able to let go of them or begin to see how you can work around them. You may also discover that just accepting something is beyond your control frees you from the feeling you should be taking some type of action.

Are you feeling like the character in the poster who says, "I can handle one day at a time, but lately several days have attacked me at once"? Could meeting with a Stephen Minister be an option for you? If so, talk to one of the pastors or to a Stephen Leader (Karen Botine, Margaret Fiechtner), about what happens during a Stephen Minister's care, and about receiving care from one of Trinity's Stephen Ministers. You can also fill out the green Confidential Care Request card in the pew rack and drop it in the Confidential Care box at the Welcome desk in the lobby.

Trust Fund Spotlight

We can do this!

One of the best parts about serving on the Trust Fund Committee is being able to say "yes" to requests that support the faith journeys of Trinity's

members or to reach persons beyond the walls of our physical facilities. In the first three months of 2018 the Trust Fund said "yes" to requests totaling \$14,099.76. And in April an additional \$18,318.86 was approved to provide for: 14 college scholar-ships; seminary support for Ben Scheirer; costs for 5 adult chaperones to the ELCA Youth Gathering; and, overhaul of one of the projectors in the sanctuary (extending its life for 2-3 more years)

The Trust Fund Committee was able to say "yes" to these requests because of the generous gifts and bequests to the Trust Fund and Endowment Fund by Trinity members like you. By themselves, many of these gifts were small; however, as all of these gifts were combined and permanently invested, they have produced enough income to make a BIG impact at Trinity. And - because the gifts are permanently invested, the income will continue into the future.

What would you like to see happen at Trinity in the future? How can you support projects or activities that will help us WELCOME, EQUIP, and SEND Trinity members on their faith journeys? Perhaps the Trust Fund or Endowment Fund could be part of the answer for you.
