This Changes Everything - A Theme Worthy for Trinity

This summer 24 youth and 6 chaperones from Trinity attended the Youth Gathering in Houston TX. Our program for the week focused on the theme *This Changes Everything*. So many qualities and accomplishments come to mind: deep spirituality, wise leadership, compelling preaching, love of the church, service to the marginalized, and leadership of the Banquet, prayer groups, and Stephen Ministry. And that's not even to mention the hundreds of personal encounters through which pastor Steve has embodied God's grace. And on a personal level, one could not ask for a more encouraging, supportive, and wise colleague. So as we say goodbye and look towards the next stage of our journey, we do so with a mixture of emotions that often accompanies great change: thanksgiving, sadness, fear, and excitement.

With all that being said, I'm sure many of you are wondering: *What comes next?* Given that this transition process is just beginning, there are obviously many details that are not yet confirmed. But to help provide a bit of a roadmap for the months ahead, council president, Jim Lewis, and I sat down and drafted the outline included on page 4. We hope that it might give you a sense of what Trinity's bright future is likely to hold.

Stephen Ministry

What Kind of Person Requests a Stephen Minister?



Sometimes the potential care receiver is a person who already knows there are no solutions or cures for the burden he/she is carrying. This person's need may just be to "let it all out" in

confidential conversation with someone who <u>won't</u> take on the role of advice-giver. Sometimes this role can be taken more effectively by someone other than a friend or family member, by a Stephen Minister, perhaps.

When someone we care about is burdened, our first instinct is often to find a way to fix the problem. If the burden-carrier already accepts that the situation can't be undone, the advice from family and friends, even if it's given with love, may not be helpful and may even add to the burden.

One of the first things Stephen Ministers learn in training is that our role is not to fix things for a care receiver, but to provide Christian care. This care may simply be to <u>listen</u> as the care receiver describes the burden he/she is carrying, and to <u>accept</u> the reality of what this person is experiencing. As this exchange happens between Stephen Minister and care receiver, the burden may feel lighter, even though no one has proposed any solutions and no "fixing" actions have been taken.

Would sharing the contents of your burden with a confidential, caring listener be helpful to you? If so, talk to one of the pastors or to a Stephen Leader (Karen Botine, Margaret Fiechtner), about what happens during a Stephen Minister's care, and about receiving care from one of Trinity's Stephen Ministers. You can also fill out the green Confidential Care Request card in the pew rack and drop it in the Confidential Care box at the Welcome desk in the lobby.

Pastoral Transition: A Roadmap for the Months Ahead

Status of Pastor Paul & Deacon Joanne: The calls of Pastor Paul and Deacon Joanne are coterminous. This means that when Pastor Steve retires on November 4th, both of these calls will also end, at least in how they were previously established. However, both Joanne and Pastor Paul have expressed to council that they would be happy to continue serving during the interim period, should Trinity so desire. Council is working with Bishop Narum on an interim contract scenario that would allow them to continue to serve during this transition period.

Interim Pastor: It takes time to complete all the steps that will lead to calling a new Senior Pastor. Rarely do churches complete these steps in less than six to twelve months, or longer. Because of this, many congregations contract with an *Interim Lead Pastor* who can help the ministry move forward in the time in between the former pastor leaving and the new pastor starting. Church council is in discussions with Bishop Narum in hopes of following a similar model.

Council & Call Committee: In the coming months Trinity leadership will likely engage with the congregation in discernment about what kind of pastor Trinity is looking for. Following this discernment process, leadership will write a Ministry Site Profile (MSP). The MSP is a document that allows churches to describe their ministry and the qualities they seek in a pastor. Also in the coming months, Trinity will need to constitute a call committee, through a congregational meeting. After all the above steps are completed, (which usually takes several months), the call committee will be responsible for reviewing applicants and interviewing candidates.

So, to summarize, Trinity has a strong leadership team working with Bishop Narum through a solid transition process. And though there are obviously many unknowns ahead, we can be confident that Trinity's future is bright and that God's Spirit will be with us every step of the way.

In the meantime, please hold our church and our leadership in prayer and feel free to reach out to your council leadership if you have any questions.

As the Needs Arise...

Summer is vacation time for many families, but for the Trinity family the needs continue, and so the work of the Trust Fund Committee continues through the summer. Thanks to modern methods of communication, it isn't even necessary to wait until a regular Trust Fund meeting (the 4th Monday of every month) to consider needs for financial support of Trinity's projects and activities. During this summer the Committee "met" by e-mail as well as in person and funded grant requests to upgrade software for the projection system, improve audio equipment, and support the landscaping project. For the first six months of 2018, the Committee was able to distribute almost \$50,000 in grants.

We have been blessed by the importance members of Trinity have given to the Trust and Endowment Funds and their gifts/ bequests to these funds. The Trust Fund Committee has been charged with investing these funds prudently, and regularly reviews how the funds are invested to achieve income goals at a reasonable cost for investment management. The reward to the Committee for these efforts is to have the privilege of saying "yes" to requests for financial support that enable Trinity to WELCOME, EQUIP, and SEND Trinity members and others on their faith journeys.
