Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Forgiveness is at the top of the list when it comes to things preached. Jesus gave us example after example of forgiveness. But to us, it sometimes seems like more of a scandal than a healthy, necessary thing to do. Like more of a moral cease-fire that comes from the words, "I'm sorry."

When we are wronged, we can think of a hundred reasons not to forgive. He needs to learn a lesson. I don't want to encourage irresponsible behavior. She needs to learn that actions have consequences. I'm sure these all sound familiar. But think of this also.

Forgiveness alone can halt the cycle of blame and pain, breaking the chain of ungrace. In the New Testament, the most common Greek word for forgiveness literally means to release, to hurl away, to free yourself.

We must not forget, from the Gospel's account, forgiveness wasn't easy for God either. Remember when Jesus was in the Garden of Gethsemane and asked, "If it is possible, may this cup be taken from me," with sweat and blood rolling off his brow.

Yet finally in one of his last statements Jesus says, "Forgive them," all of them, the Roman soldiers, the religious leaders, his disciples, and those hanging next to him, and you and me. "Forgive them for they know not what they do."

Only by becoming a human could the Son of God truly say, "They do not know what they are doing." Having lived among us, he now understood.

Forgiveness may be hard, but it is the right thing to do. It is right for you, for the one who must be forgiven, and for God.

May God's blessing be with you.

Healthy bodies and minds require nutritious meals at every age. But when people don't have enough food or have to choose inexpensive foods with low-nutritional value, it can seriously impact their health. And once the cycle of poor diet and poor health begins, it can be hard to break.

Simply put, hunger's toll can be life-altering.

When someone is sick, having to choose between food and treatment can lead to serious complications. For example, for food-insecure adults living with diabetes, the choice between food and controlling the disease can even lead to complications like kidney disease, eye disease and nerve damage.

- Food insecurity can lead to Type 2 diabetes, high blood pressure, heart disease and obesity.
- Children at risk of hunger are more likely to be in poor health and struggle in school.

Family members in food-insecure households are also more likely to struggle with psychological and behavioral health issues. And kids struggling to get enough to eat are more likely to have problems in school and other social situations.

Food insecurity is a big health issue. That's why we are working to introduce a Food Truck to low-income neighborhoods. That's why we have the food giveaway tables at The Banquet during meals. Thanks to the new Cash Wise North and Great Plains Food Bank, we have been able to distribute much food that otherwise would have gone to waste. We also work to ensure each meal is well balanced serving each one of the 4 food groups.

The battle against food insecurity is constant but we believe the low income, especially our children and seniors are worth the fight.

Stephen Ministry

What kind of person can benefit from the care of a Stephen Minister?

A man like Adam. Life couldn't have been any better – and then, everything changed. Adam lost his job, his home, and his close (perhaps even face-to-face) relationship with God. He had to start over somewhere outside the Garden of Eden. What thoughts were running through his mind? Did he feel alone in the muddle his life had become? Did he wonder "Where is God when I need Him?"

The Bible tells us God was still present in Adam's life. Genesis 3:20 records that, before God sent Adam and Eve out of the Garden, "He made for them garments of skin and clothed them". Imagine that! Adam and Eve went out into a world less kind than the Garden of Eden, but they wore clothes personally tailored for them by a God who still cared about them and provided some physical protection for them!

When life changes drastically, it's often difficult to recognize that we are not alone. It can be helpful to talk to someone (a Stephen Minister, perhaps) who can help us identify the ways God is still present and caring for us. These ways may be very different from the care we previously received, but it may be just what we need right now.
