## **A Happy and Blessed New Year to all!**

"Old habits die hard" goes the old saying. How true that is! Perhaps that is why our New Year's resolutions tend to get recycled every year. The old is comfortable and familiar...the new untried and foreign. We come to a new year wanting people, things, life in general to be better and then find we brought all the old bag-gage of life past along with us.

For centuries people believed that Aristotle was right when he said that the heavier an object, the faster it would fall to the earth. Aristotle was regarded as the greatest thinker of all time, and surely he could not be wrong. Anyone, of course, could have taken two objects, one heavy and one light, and dropped them from a great height to see whether or not the heavier object landed first. But no one did until nearly 2,000 years after Aristotle's death. In 1589, Galileo summoned learned professors to the base of the leaning tower of Pisa. Then he went to the top and pushed off a ten pound weight and a one pound weight at the same time. Both hit the ground below at the same instant. The power of past belief was so strong, however, that the professors denied their own eyesight. They continued to say that Aristotle was right. The learned professors missed the new truth and clung on to the old error. Old habits die hard.

In 1903, Orville and Wilbur Wright sent a telegram from Kitty Hawk, North Carolina where they were carrying on their flight experiments, to their sister in Dayton, Ohio. The telegram said *"First sustained flight today, fifty -nine seconds. Home for Christmas."* Their sister took the message to the Dayton newspaper, and the next morning a brief news item appeared under the headline, *"Popular local bicycle merchants will be home for the holidays."* The newspaper missed the point. They failed to see that the Wright brothers were doing a new thing.

You and I have been to the manger again. We have seen the Christ child. In Christ, God was coming to dwell with us in a very *'new'* way. The gift of Christ is to be a gift of *'newness.'* The birth of Christ is to bring new meaning to life, new meaning to each day, new meaning to how we relate to one another in this *'old'* world.

We will soon be in the season of Epiphany on our church calendar. Epiphany begins on January 6th, following the twelve day season of Christmas which began December 25<sup>th</sup>. The season of Epiphany will last until Ash Wednesday on February 26<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Besides its central meaning commemorating the manifestation of Christ to the gentiles from the adoration of the Magi, or wise men, epiphany can also mean a sudden, intuitive perception of or insight into the reality or essential meaning of something, usually initiated by some simple, homely, or commonplace occurrence or experience. In other words, an epiphany is an *'aha'* moment.

As we begin this new year of living together in God's grace in this place, may we have some 'aha' moments. May we find newness of life, newness of purpose, newness in our faith walk as we follow this child, born in a manger for you and for me.


Effective January, 2020, the church office will be closed on Fridays.

# **Stephen Ministry**



If you are a parent, you probably experience mixed emotions when one of your children begins to do something independently that used to

require your help – feeding him/her self, driving the car (alone), going off to college or that first home-away-fromhome. It's a natural part of the growing-up process, and you want your child to become independent, but still – your role in this child's life changes, and that can be painful.

Stephen Ministers experience some of these same emotions when a care receiver says, "*Thanks for your support and encouragement. I'm ready to move on without your help.*" This is the goal for every Stephen Minister as he or she enters a caring relationship. It's gratifying to see that a care receiver has adjusted to a new reality after a tough time, but this new step for the care receiver means the relationship that developed between care receiver and Stephen Minister during their weekly meetings will change, or perhaps end entirely.

How long does a caring relationship last? Long enough to give the care receiver the support he or she needs. This could be as little as a few weeks, or it could be several years.

Who decides when a caring relationship ends? The care receiver makes this decision when he or she feels ready to move on without the Stephen Minister's support. Often, the Stephen Minister has noticed that the care receiver talks about the original issue less often, that the weekly meetings have become less intense and perhaps more social, or even that the care receiver is willing to meet less often. The Stephen Minister and the care receiver may discuss these changes and plan for ending the relationship at a time that is comfortable for both of them.

What happens next? Again, this depends on the care receiver. Some care receivers and Stephen Ministers have developed relationships that neither wants to give up completely, so they agree to meet periodically as friends, rather than as caregiver and care receiver. In other cases, the relationship may end completely. Each caring situation is unique.

Are you at a point in your life where some Christian support and encouragement would be helpful in getting through a tough time? If so, contact one of the Stephen Leaders (Margaret Fiechtner, Karen Botine). If you know someone who is going through this type of situation, encourage them to consider a Stephen Minister's support.

### **Trust Fund Spotlight**



The start of a new year is traditionally a time when people resolve to make some type of change that will improve their lives... lose weight, develop and follow a budget, eat less (or more) chocolate. Typically, most New Year's resolutions have been abandoned within a month or two. Just ask the staff at any exercise facility. Why not make a different kind of resolution for 2020?

If you are unable to make decisions, do those who will make the decisions know what you would want? Have you provided for guardianship of any minor children? Do you have health care directives? Have you planned for the distribution of your estate? Putting your wishes in writing in the appropriate legal manner can be a gift in itself.

If your plans for the distribution of your estate include a bequest to Trinity, the language used to express your wishes is important. If your intent is that the bequest be permanently invested in the Trust Fund where only the investment income is spent, the language in your will, insurance policy, or other part of your estate plan must state that Trinity's <u>Trust Fund</u> is to be the recipient. If the language states that the bequest is to "Trinity", it will not automatically go to the Trust Fund. It may be used for other worthy purposes, as determined by the church Council. If your intent is that the principal of the bequest be spent, rather than permanently invested, this should also be stated. This type of bequest will be placed in a dedicated account and used for the purposes you specified.

Estate planning can be a way to express what is important to you. Make certain your wishes are carried out by (1) putting your wishes in writing, and (2) discussing your plans with your family and with those who will be responsible for carrying out your wishes. If you have questions about how the Trust Fund would fit into your plans, talk to a Trust Fund Committee member: Dan Welsh, Richard Bjornson, Richard Hanson, Dwight Offerman, or Susan Weiand.
