One of my childhood memories is the excitement of one particular Christmas gift. I was young - maybe a second or third grader. My older brother and I received a set of Walkie Talkies from our parents – I was sooooo excited. After opening them I was already beginning to imagine all of the adventures the two of us could engage in around the farm. As the evening wound to an end mom sent us upstairs to bed. With newly opened gifts in hand we headed upstairs – hard wooden stairs. Half-ways up the staircase my Walkie Talkie slid off the top of the gifts I was carrying and landed hard on the steps. It looked fine on the outside – but inside the crystal had shattered. We had never even gotten to use these precious gifts and already mine was hopelessly broken. I still remember how devastated I was.

There are many things, which when broken may never mend. An expert seamstress can fix a rip in a piece of clothing but the scar will always be there. A broken piece of pottery might be able to be glued together but the crack will always be there.

Why all this talk of broken things? Last month Pastor Lee, in this space, wrote about the infrastructure needs of our church. We are just beginning to learn the scope of repairs needed. New windows in what has been called the education building. A new air handling system for the sanctuary. New heating and cooling controls for the entire building and more. These repairs will come with a substantial price tag. Nothing will happen until the Property Committee has thoroughly vetted the projects, council has reviewed it, members of the congregation have been informed and then voted on how to proceed. Here is my point – people are going to have different opinions. There will be deep discussion. In the midst of all of it we need to remember we, as a church, are the body of Christ. In the midst of conversation, discussions and even debate we need to tend to our relationships – our unity.

Our unity in Christ is essential for the future of the ministry. Our care and respect for one another needs to be central. Once relationships are broken or strained there is always the danger that they might never be restored. Nothing is worth such an outcome.

So, we pray for the process moving forward. Pray for wise guidance, honest conversation and caring concern for each member of the body of Christ.

## **Summer reflections**

Summer is a great time to reflect on how God continues to make a claim on the beloved community of the church against all odds. God's persistence in the life of the church is truly a treasure! Accounts of Jesus forming his followers through storytelling and with mighty acts inspire us to persevere and even flourish.

Jeremiah the prophet was compelled to speak even though he had no assurance that his words would have any effect. The great fertility of God's word produces fruit like rain promotes crop growth. In Jesus' parable of the wheat and weeds, we are to shine like the sun even when weeds are planted because God is the gardener and God will reap what is sown.

Jesus promotes a singular focus on what he calls the "kingdom of heaven." Parable after parable speaks about glorious things coming from a small seed, a little yeast, or a treasure hidden in a field. Jesus brings the abundance of God to a hungry crowd with just a little bread and a couple of fish. God works in small, hidden things here and now. What are the gifts that we have received that look small but really are not small? What treasures are hidden in our communities that spark the imagination to see the kingdom of heaven right in front of us?

The Lectionary texts this summer reveal a sense of awe in Jesus' command of wind and wave, his healing power, and his own identity as the one who saves. Notice the disciples' fear of the storm at sea and their mistaking Jesus for a ghost. Notice Peter, the "Rock," sinking into the water before being pulled out by the hand of Jesus. And then see how those in the boat worshiped Jesus. Weaving this narrative into our own patterns of fear and doubt, how might we be reassured by Jesus' attention to the fearful, terrified ones in the rocking boat? How do we experience Jesus attending to our doubts? How can we receive his power and presence in the tumult of our lives, and how does such receiving lead us to worship?

The beloved community we call the church is continually being shaped by its attention to the word of God. Each day our baptismal callings are formed in Christ for life. Despite our setbacks, misunderstandings, or distractions, God continues to come close. The prophet Isaiah declares that "the LORD will comfort Zion; he will comfort all her waste places, and will make her wilderness like Eden, her desert like the garden of the Lord". We are given a precious gift through Christ's life, death, and resurrection. We find renewal in this gift in the summertime as we live into the kingdom of heaven.

# **Stephen Ministry**



We aren't the only ones who have feelings of fear, anger, despair, or uncertainty during life's difficulties. The writers of Psalms experienced

these same feelings, and expressed their feelings to God in very specific terms: *How many are my foes! Many are rising against me...* (Psalm 3:1). In Psalm 10, the writer describes how the wicked treat others (the "poor" and "helpless") and wonders why God is "standing far away". Again in Psalm 13 the writer asks God: *Will you forget me forever?*"

What intrigues me about these and other Psalms that lament injustice or cry for help is that they also include a "but", a "yet", or a "still" -- a reminder that God <u>is</u> present and does know the concerns of His children. In Psalm 3:3 the writer in fear for his life also remembers *But you, O Lord, are a shield about me...* In Psalm 10, the writer who despairs at the actions of the wicked also remembers that God <u>does</u> see these actions (verse 14), that God will *hear the desire of the afflicted* (verse 17), and *...do justice...*verse 18). And in Psalm 13 the writer remembers that God's love is *steadfast* (verse 5) and that God has *dealt bountifully* with the writer (verse 6).

What are the "buts", "yets", and "stills" that remind you God is present in your life, even in the midst of whatever difficulties are weighing you down right now? How might Stephen Ministry help you or someone you know during this time? If you have ideas, please contact one of the Stephen Leaders (Karen Botine, Margaret Fiechtner) and share your views.

# **Trust Fund Spotlight**



### **Building Maintenance...**

Trinity is "property rich" with both interior square footage and external green space and parking, but having buildings that range in age from the early 1930's to the late 1960's brings challenges. These challenges include keeping everything in good working condition and, over time, making the operation of our property more environmentally "green."

This is why the Trust Fund committee has designated some of the Trust Fund income for the **Building Maintenance** account. In past years, this account has paid for new cove lighting in the sanctuary and new lights in the church school classrooms, foundation repairs and replacement of leaking windows in the 1930's building, a commercial water heater, and a snow blower. Most recently, the Trust Fund paid for extreme costs for snow removal, new lighting in the Sanctuary, increased Audio/ Visual capabilities and other projects. Having income in the Building Maintenance account for projects such as these takes some pressure off the general budget of the church.
