On Sunday, August 16th, it was two years since we lost the "Queen of Soul", Aretha Franklin to the bonds of heaven. I was always a big Aretha fan, as 'rhythm and blues' is one of my favorite genres of music, and no one since Ella Fitzgerald could 'phrase' like Aretha. Besides her signature songs from the 1960's, I also really liked her later work like "Freeway of Love", "Who's Zoomin' Who?" and "I Dreamed a Dream", her cover of that song from Les Miserables. One of her lesser chart successes is a favorite of mine, "Ever Changing Times" from 1992. This duet with Michael McDonald includes the lyric:

"I see that clock upon the wall, well it don't bother me at all. It's an ever changing time"

It is an ever changing time. Since the second week of March, we find ourselves living out our days and nights in an environment of which we have no sense of prior experience that we could use as a template for how to maneuver through these anxious times. Amid all the changes that happen in life, remember Hebrews 13:8, Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. Christ's love for us remains the same, his gifts to us remain the same, regardless of that clock upon the wall.

Moving toward autumn days

As we enter into the Autumn season, Jesus tells a series of parables in the gospels to describe this life with God that in Matthew is called "the kingdom of heaven." In Jesus' parables we find that mercy meets justice head on. In one parable, a king is the model of unexpected forgiveness for a great debt. In another, a landowner hiring day laborers pays the same wage to all, no matter what time of day they began their work. And in yet another, a king extends a wedding invitation to those in the streets when others more likely to respond reject the initial invitation. Jesus' stories surprise his listeners, causing them to rethink their place.

God surprises those who are on the *outside* and invites them in. In what ways have we found ourselves on the margins, or noticed others who are neglected? God also surprises those who are on the *inside*, confronting them with their privilege. In what ways have we exploited our status at the expense of others? In Philippians, Paul the apostle puzzles about his own elevated station in life as a Pharisee, but then rethinks everything that might be considered "gain" now as "loss," "because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord".

Mercy might be the joyful refrain for our communal lives with God. We can laugh at Jonah, and at ourselves, as we say along with the reluctant prophet, "I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing". Can we imagine a church named "The Church of Second Chances" (or third, fourth, fifth, sixth, or seventh)? Are there stories you can tell or invite others to tell about starting over that might be connected to renewal of ministries in your congregation? In those stories, and in the readings that shape this season, we can come to realize that the adage "The church is a hospital for sinners, not a museum for saints" is just right for us! The readings for September and October touch on mutual forgiveness, laboring in the vineyard, loving God and neighbor, service, and who is really doing the will of God.


The Banquet

Stephen Ministry

Lights on!

The handle of my hairbrush glows in the dark. I assume this is a natural characteristic of the plastic, since I can't think of a reason someone would need to find and use their hairbrush in the dark. The faint glow does do one important thing, however; it reminds me of a Bible verse. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it. (John 1:5, NRSV)

John 1:5 reminds me that, even in the darkest times, there is a light and that light is Christ. I am not alone in the dark. I may not be able to see everything around me, but being able to see that there is light gives me comfort. And if I head toward that light, I am going in the right direction.

The theme of Stephen Ministry is *Christ caring for people through people*. Notice that this does not limit the caring to Stephen-Ministry-trained people. <u>All</u> of us are challenged to make the light of Christ visible as we care for others, especially during their times of darkness. John 1:5 does not say how big the light is, only that it is never overcome by the darkness. The size of your light and the size of the care you give are not the important points. A friendly voice behind your mask or a "thank you" to someone might be all that is needed to change the direction of that person's day. On these hot days, a "cup of cold water" (not a tanker-load) might be just what someone needs.

Are there ways you could be a glimmer of light in someone else's life at this time?

I do what I can do. I act in what I know.

And I trust that God's love shown in Christ will shine on me, will shine on my path.
